And Divine did my hair for the original "Hairspray". Said I had the best hair in Baltimore.


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



HCC Committee Updates

HCC Zoning & Land Use Committee Update By Martin Burian

Buena Vista Ave and Dellwood Ave

The HCC received notice that the City received a resubmitted subdivision plan for the corner of Buena Vista Avenue and Dellwood Avenue from owners/developers Greendoor Properties and Stonewall Development. The developers engaged with neighbors on essentially the same plans in 2018, and ultimately received approval for the subdivision. However, the approval lapsed when the project did not move forward.

The current subdivision plan includes the same six townhomes, a forest conservation area and the possibility of an additional freestanding home, as in the previous plan. There is also an easement proposed for the existing continuation of Morling Avenue to Buena Vista Avenue. The proposed design for the townhomes remains three- to four-story modern structures. The HCC is working to reach out to neighbors to provide input on the proposed development. 1006 W 36th St (Tattoo Studio)

A tattoo artist is proposing to use retail space on the Avenue for a tattoo studio in the space of the former Hampden Junque boutique. The building is zoned in a Neighborhood Business (C-1) district and use of the space as a tattoo studio is a conditional use. A hearing on the conditional use appeal before the Board of Municipal Zoning Appeals is currently scheduled for December 1.
